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

Art Workshops with Craigmillar community 4 June – 30 July 2008 Exhibition of Polish Artist in Edinburgh 3 August 2008

about project



It's My Place is a community based project organized under Scottish Polish Cultural Association by Goshka Białek, Robert Motyka and Joanna Zawadzka.

In the last couple of years, Scotland has experienced a great number of Polish nationals coming to live and work in the country. Edinburgh has become the main destination for newcomers, and has accommodated almost 35,000 of them. Since new migrants represent a big part of the city's population, it is important to support their successful integration, facilitate cultural exchange and widen Polish-Scottish cooperation.

Many young Polish people who emigrated to Scotland frequently work below their qualifications, and do not fully employ their knowledge and talents. Very often, due to lower accommodation costs, they decide to live in disadvantaged neighbourhoods, where local communities, often reluctant to the newcomers, are difficult to approach. These young Polish people are full of energy and open to new challenges, wanting to use their creativity.

It's My Place, initiated by Goshka Białek, wants to bring together and engage those talented and energetic members of Polish community, and use their ideas and creativity to support their local neighbourhoods and integrate them with local communities.

Throughout the summer, a series of workshops and master classes were carried at Craigmillar Arts Centre and Niddrie Community Church, exploring a variety of art techniques in the theme of *It's My Place*. Workshops were run by professional artists experienced in community art projects, and several young Polish artists living in Scotland, who had learned how to work with people of different backgrounds and abilities. They have also gained valuable experience in art project management, learned how to organize their workspace and promote their art.

Working hand in hand with professional artists, students and participants from the community will put together a final exhibition displayed in local galleries in Edinburgh at the beginning of August and September. The exhibition will also be presented during the Polish Cultural Festival in Edinburgh in April 2009. The project will be carried out in two stages; this year was based in Edinburgh and the next year will be organized in Kraków, by our partners in Poland.

The project is supported by Awards for All (Lottery funding), The Senate of the Republic of Poland, the Polish Consulate in Edinburgh, Edinburgh City Council, Kraków City Council and other organisations.



It's My Place: Final Exhibition 30 July – 6 August 2008 @ Craigmillar Arts Space

It's My Place is a collective and individual exhibition at the same time. Eighteen artists are showing works presenting their search of their own place; My place, the place I choose. I try to be happy and satisfied here. The place where I want to live. The place which I dream about.

The opening of the Final Exhibition, featuring contemporary paintings, sculptures and photographs by Polish and Scottish artists participating in project, will take place at Craigmillar Arts Space, on 3 August at 7 pm.

Two public sculptures especially made during the workshops for Craigmillar Arts Community by Polish and Scottish artists will be presented for the first time at the exhibition. The event will include live music and visualizations, and Polish Art Scotland will organize the screening of films and Polish food tasting. The patron of the event will be the Consul General of the Republic of Poland in Edinburgh, Mr Aleksander Dietkow.

The exhibition will be curated by Mateusz Jarza with advice from Prof. Sylva Petrova and will continue 30 July – 6 August 2008, 11 am – 4 pm, at Craigmillar Arts Space, 11 Harewood Road, Edinburgh EH16 4NT.

Goshka Białek

I am a sculptor, teacher and cultural animator. I have BA (2000) and MA (2003) degrees in Sculpture and Glass, and also MSc in Economics; specialisation: economic cybernetics and computer science (1986). Currently I am based in Edinburgh; before that I lived in Durham (1990-2006) and Warsaw (until 1990).

I work with a variety of materials, but I am fascinated by transparent and semitransparent materials, because seeing inside the sculpture creates a 'fourth dimension'.

My work is usually quite large scale and sculptural, often exploring various aspects of the human form. I am fascinated by the beauty of the human body (even, or perhaps especially when, it is not beautiful in a conventional sense) and by people's embarrassment when confronted by nakedness. I am also interested in the connection between the past and the present.

I have had exhibitions in the North East of England, and also in London, Lincolnshire, Surrey, Iceland, Poland and Iran. My most prestigious projects to date were in Durham Cathedral (Echo of the Past), where I was the first artist since 14th century allowed to exhibit at the High Altar, in Tehran (Reflection), and in the British Embassy in Reykjavik. www.goshka.art.pl



Mark Carr

Edinburgh/Fife based sculptor Mark Carr creates Kinetic sculptures and hybrid musical instruments.

He has exhibited his sculptures in Princes Street Gardens, Charlotte Square for the Book festival, The Scottish Museum, Edinburgh and The Kibble Palace in Glasgow Botanic Gardens. Internationally, he has exhibited in Berlin, Lisbon, France, Spain and Holland.

He soundtracked Arches Theatre Company productions *Beowulf* and *Tam 'O'Shanter* and *@ootprint* for The National Theatre of Scotland among others. He collaborated with movement artist Brian Hartley in Shear and Shearwater in Glasgow, Edinburgh, Dundee, London and Turin Italy. Mark's solo albums were championed by the late great John Peel in 1990's. He was one of 12 artists commissioned by the BBC to help set up the BI AST website.

The main part of our project was a series of workshops that have taken place in Craigmillar Arts Centre and Niddrie Community Church from 2 June to 6 August 2008. Artists and art students led art workshops, mainly sculpture ones, for the local communities and artists engaged in the project.

During the main sculpture workshops, Mark Carr and Goshka Białek were sharing their knowledge about cast glass, making moulds, welding, grinding, carving and working with a kiln, with the public to create two sculptures for the Craigmillar Community Arts. All workshops were staffed by art students and practising professional artists, who have been trying to enable, encourage and inspire as many people as possible to have a go at creating various forms of three dimensional art, making flying objects, making hats, painting, taking photographs, new media and much more. Workshops were organized to enable artists to learn how to work with the community and how to share their knowledge with others.

Workshops had been very successful in generating great interest by local community, people of all ages and

backgrounds who were participating. People taking part in the project learned how to work with various unusual materials i.e. semitransparent concrete, and were using innovative techniques that they could utilise in many ways in the future.

Some of the works, including two public sculptures made during the workshops, were displayed at the final exhibition on 3 August 2008.

Ania Lebiedzka Hat-making workshops

Hat-making workshops were focused on creating funny hats in a short time. The hats were made from ordinary materials like colored and transparent plastic foil combined with fresh flowers. Working with disabled people gave me a unique opportunity to teach them how to develop their creativity with others through art.





Tekla Woźniak New media workshops

During the workshop, I presented a visual material presentation prepared by me as a DVD projected on a screen via multimedia projector. This visual material was presenting a person encouraging the viewers to draw, and to follow her movements. Additionally, it presented several fragments of music soundtracks and changing colours to which the participants were supposed to react through the production of particular drawings. A series of drawings put in sequences were re-filmed via video camera, with the help of participants. The effect, presented on the screen as a form of a simple animation, made it possible to immediately see the result of participant's work, and was stimulating them to produce more drawings.
